NEW CENTURY SCHOLARS

The New Century Scholars (NCS) program is a relatively new program for a relatively new century. Launched in 2001, the year-long program extends the mission and outreach of the traditional Fulbright Scholar Program by bringing together experts from around the world to examine topics of global significance. Unlike the traditional program, NCS combines the talents and views both of American and international scholars. Each year, an open competition is held to select approximately 30 scholars and practitioners from around the world.

HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?

Scholars collaborate year-round, but meet for seminars just three times: at the beginning, middle, and end of the grant year. Throughout the year, scholars conduct research individually and work in sub-groups under the guidance of the Distinguished Scholar Leader, an eminent academician. At the yearend NCS seminar, participants share the results of their individual and collaborative efforts and also develop recommendations. NCS-recommended initiatives transform powerfully collaborative thinking into real-world efforts with tangible local, regional and global impact.

WHAT TOPICS DO NEW CENTURY SCHOLARS TYPICALLY EXAMINE?

NCS is thematic. Emphasizing a global, multidisciplinary approach, participating scholars develop models to help us understand the social contexts within which nations and communities shape their responses to 21st century challenges. Past topics have

included the challenges of health crises in a world without borders, sectarian and ethnic conflicts, the empowerment of women, the global challenges of education, and issues of access and equity in higher education.

Scholars will next examine the

university as an innovation driver and knowledge center. Specifically, scholars will reflect on the ways in which universities – our world's major knowledge centers – relate to private-sector enterprise and act as economic engines for communities, regions and the world-at-large.
